- Staying home is still the best way to protect yourself and others from getting sick.
- It is still recommended that residents of Wisconsin cancel or postpone all travel *unless* they are fully vaccinated.
- Both international and U.S. travel is risky.
- The spread of COVID-19 can change quickly, including areas of your travel destination.
- *Before* traveling, consider the following: Is it necessary to make this trip? Is COVID-19 spreading where you're going? Will you or those you are traveling with be within 6 feet of others during or after your trip? Are you or other travelers at high risk for being hospitalized from COVID-19? Does the city or county where you live or visit require you to stay home and quarantine after traveling?

What does this mean?

- The CDC and the FDA recommend use of the Johnson & Johnson Vaccine *resume* (after it was paused).
- A review of all available data at this times shows that the Johnson & Johnson Vaccine's known and potential benefits *outweigh* its known and potential risks.
- The CDC and the FDA will continue to monitor the safety of all the COVID-19 vaccines.
- There were reports of adverse events following the use of the Johnson & Johnson Vaccine. This suggested an increased risk of a rare adverse event which involves blood clots with low platelets. Nearly all the reports of this serious condition have been in women younger than 50 years old.
- Women younger than 50 years old should be aware of the rare, but increased risk of this adverse event. There are other COVID-19 vaccine options available for which this risk has not been seen.
